

Writing Mechanics & Grammar → Subject-Verb Agreement Level: High School

When the noun or subject of a sentence is singular, it takes a singular verb in the predicate of the sentence, and when the subject is plural, it requires a plural verb. That basic rule applies even if other modifiers and phrases stand between the noun and verb. Things get more complicated if you have two or more noun subjects joined by nor/or, which means that the noun nearest to the verb determines whether it's singular or plural. But two or more noun subjects joined by "and" always require the plural. You also need to watch for collective nouns, which are singular hours describing a group (like "family"), two nouns that work together to name a single thing (like "rock and roll"), or words like "each" and "every". These all take singular verbs as well.
